Threshold and category guidance for professionals attending Child Protection Conferences

As a professional attending Conference, you will be asked to provide a view about whether or not a child is at continued risk of suffering, or is likely to suffer, significant harm. This decision is an important one and must be evidence based, as it justifies compulsory intervention in family life (Working Together 2023).

Protective security and preparedness for education settings

The Protective security and preparedness for education settings is non-statutory guidance and provides advice to help educational settings to become better prepared for and able to respond to terrorism and other major incidents. It sets out practical steps to keep learners and staff safe in the event of an incident through simple and cost-effective methods. The guidance is aimed at those working in settings who have existing responsibilities for emergency planning and response and site security and staff new to concepts of protective security and preparedness. It is recommended that all staff read this guidance to ensure all are able to identify security vulnerabilities, suspicious activity and respond when there is an incident.

NCA: Financially motivated sexual extortion

The Get Safe Team want to raise everyone's awareness of the increase of online sexual exploitation of children and young people, using their sexual images to extort money from children using fear as a tactic.



The NCA (National Crime Agency) have produced a document for all educational settings to share with staff / parents and carers regarding financially motivated extortion.

Globally, there has been a large increase in reports of children and young people being forced into paying money or meeting another financial demand (such as purchasing a pre-paid gift card) after an offender has threatened to release nudes or semi-nudes of them. This is financially motivated sexual extortion, a type of online blackmail often referred to in the media as 'sextortion'. It is a form of child sexual abuse.

Keep Me Safe... When I am Crying

Keep Me Safe... When I am Crying is a new guidance to support those who meet with families with babies of a very young age where crying may be reported as a worry or concern by the parent or carer.

Babies cry for many reasons. They are hardwired to cry whenever they need a parent or carer to help them out because their brains have yet to develop the circuits that allow for self-control or understanding.

Any practitioner who has contact with a family with a new- or very young- baby needs to understand why babies cry and how to support families to keep babies safe.

star* scheme

Our Why?

star* scheme supports young people and families to overcome the impact of experiencing Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACE's) through engagement with grassroots rugby. Research shows that in order for young people to overcome the impact of ACEs, they need to build resilience through relationships with trusted adults; grassroots rugby is the perfect space for this to happen. We provide access and resources that a young person and family might need to enable them to engage with the sport, from kit to transport. We also work with rugby clubs to provide specific training to ensure adults are informed and equipped to provide the support and space that a young person



needs. We are committed to ensuring that ACEs are mitigated by being involved in sport, with everyone at the scheme committed to developing young people into leaders of the future.

Our How?

The coaches and officials of junior rugby clubs achieve amazing things with young people every season. **star*** scheme works to support clubs to identify young people in their communities, both at their club and beyond, who have ACEs (including poor mental or emotional wellbeing and / or who are financially disadvantaged) and provide them with support access to the sport of rugby. The scheme provides funding, training, and support to the clubs to enable them to continue to achieve. We work with families to remove the barriers to participation in grassroots rugby and make sure that the children have what they need to enjoy the game, be it a kit, transport, training or a friendly and supportive face.

Mental Health First Aider Qualification

Aims and objectives:

The Youth MHFA two-day course qualifies you as a Youth Mental Health First Aider and this aims to provide you with

- An in depth understanding of young people's mental health and factors that affect wellbeing
- Practical skills to spot the triggers and signs of mental health issues
- Confidence to reassure and support a young person in distress
- Enhanced interpersonal skills such as non-judgemental listening
- Knowledge to help a young person recover their health by guiding them to further support –
 whether that's through self-help sites, their place of learning, the NHS, or a mix engaging
 with parents, carers and external agencies where appropriate
- The ability to support a young person with a long-term mental health issue or disability to thrive
- Tools to look after your own mental wellbeing
