Latest education news and updates

School leavers - reminder to schools

As a statutory requirement all schools are expected to advise WCF of in-year leavers and choose an appropriate reason for de-rolling via the Childrens Services Portal. The portal is the expected method of notifying the local authority of school leavers and should always be completed even if another service/team in the authority has also been advised. These notifications also need to include children who leave the school during the summer holidays due to changing schools (outside of normal transition), moving away/leaving the country, moving into the Independent sector, or where parents have chosen to Electively Home Educate (EHE).

Last year the Children's Commissioner contacted all local authorities to undertake an exercise in confirming children's destinations who were at a school in the January 2022 census but not in the January 2023 census. Whilst providing the data for this response, it became evident that Worcestershire children who have a change of circumstances during the summer holidays are the most likely not to be notified to us and as such, we are asking that if a school is aware of a child that has moved away/left the country, changed schools, entered the independent sector, or left to EHE during the recent (and future) summer holidays, a portal leaving notification is completed as soon as possible. Please do not send notifications for children transitioning between phases unless the child is no longer transitioning to their expected/allocated school due to the reasons above.

Sustainability Leadership and Climate Action Plans in Education

Story Choices - call for participants in a research project!

For the attention of schools that cater for pre-school children (ages 3 to 4).

Please see message below on behalf of Professor Julia Carroll, Coventry University about an exciting opportunity to get involved in their **Story Choices** project.

All Early Years settings know about the value of storybook reading sessions. This project will investigate how much planning these storybook sessions makes a difference to outcomes.

They want to compare two different approaches: a responsive or child-led approach, where children choose the book; and a planned approach where the educator plans the book and discussion ahead of time.

The Story Choices project is delivered by Coventry University. They will be working with private and maintained early years settings in Greater Manchester, West Midlands and East Midlands, focusing on children in the year before they start reception class.

This project is different from previous Education Endowment Foundation projects in that they are not asking educators to deliver a pre-packaged programme. Instead, they are interested in looking at how powerful small changes in everyday practice can be. This means that:

- You will be taking part in research with immediate, practical relevance for others in your position.
- This project can work flexibly with a variety of weekly routines in different contexts. As long as you have regular group storybook reading sessions, you can do this project
- At the end of the project, your setting will receive a voucher of £200 and access to LanguageScreen, a digital tool to allow you to assess the language levels of the children in your setting (worth £245)

CAST Service update

Herefordshire and Worcestershire CAMHS services offer advice and consultation through their SPA telephone line in Worcestershire and the CAMHS telephone line in Herefordshire. Parents and professionals can contact Worcestershire CAMHS SPA clinicians on 01905 520520 for advice on services available, signposting and support with the referral process.

The CAST service which provided 60-90 minute consultation in schools within Worcestershire is currently on pause whilst they review capacity, demand, and clinical safety within the wider CAMHS service.

The Wellbeing and Emotional Support Team (WEST) continue to provide school based activities and consultation in selected schools across Worcestershire. They recognise the valuable resource that the CAST service is, however, they need to ensure as a service they are focusing their clinical capacity with those children and young people who have the highest level of need, whilst they have a number of vacancies that they recruit too.

Worcestershire paediatric ADHD service

On behalf of Herefordshire and Worcestershire Health and Care NHS Trust, please see message below regarding a change to referrals into the Worcestershire paediatric ADHD service. On Monday 3rd June 2024, a minor change was made to the way in which parents/carers and schools/educational settings complete a paediatric ADHD referral.

Previously, our referral process required two separate forms, one for completion by parents/carers and the other by the child's school/educational setting. We have now streamlined the process by combining these into a single referral form, to be completed collaboratively by parents and school staff.

Increase in Pertussis (whooping cough) cases

Cases in whooping cough are continuing to rise therefore there is the potential for outbreaks in nurseries, schools and childcare settings.

Whooping cough, also known as pertussis, is a respiratory disease which is spread by coughing and sneezing. The symptoms often start like a cold, progressing to outbursts of coughing which can sometimes cause vomiting or choking. The cough sometimes has a characteristic 'whoop' sound and can last for up to 3 months or more in some people.

Whooping cough is caused by the *Bordetella pertussis* bacteria and can cause serious and life-threatening complications such as pneumonia, difficulty in breathing and seizures. Whooping Cough can affect people at all ages; however, severe complications and deaths occur mostly in infants under 6 months of age.

Whooping cough is a notifiable disease in England and Wales. This means health professionals must inform local health protection teams of suspected cases. UK Health Security Agency collects data on [notifiable diseases](#). This data helps healthcare professionals track outbreaks and trends in disease occurrence over time.

Immunisation is the most effective way to protect against whooping cough. It is vital that:

- Pregnant women get vaccinated to protect their babies from birth. Women can be vaccinated against whooping cough at any time in pregnancy from 16 weeks gestation until when they give birth. However, ideally pregnant women should receive the vaccine between 20-32 weeks gestation. This ensures the mother has enough time to respond to the vaccine and for antibodies to be transferred to the baby across the placenta. If the vaccine is given after the 18-20-week congenital anomaly scan this means that, even if a baby is born prematurely, they are likely to have some protection.
- Infants receive their vaccines at 8, 12 and 16 weeks of age or as soon as possible after that if their vaccines are delayed. This will offer them protection against Pertussis until their booster at age 3.

Updated public health advice for children with scabies

Scabies is an itchy skin rash caused by a tiny burrowing mite called *Sarcoptes scabiei*. Intense itching occurs in the area where the mite burrows. The symptoms of scabies are an intense itching, especially at night and a raised rash or spots, which may look red. The spots are more difficult to see on brown or black skin, but you should be able to feel them.

The scabies rash usually spreads across the whole body, apart from the head and neck. It often affects skin between the fingers, around the wrists, under the arms, and around the waist, groin, and bottom. Scabies is easily treated with skin creams or lotions which a pharmacist can recommend.

National guidance previously stated that individuals with Scabies should be excluded from education settings until they had completed their first treatment.

This guidance has been updated as follows:

Affected individuals can attend the setting with advice to avoid close physical contact with others until 24 hours after the first dose of chosen treatment.

Young children not able to adhere to this advice due to their age (e.g. those under 5 years old) or additional needs, should be excluded from the setting until 24 hours after the first dose of chosen treatment. The risks/benefits of this should be reviewed on a case by case basis and take into account the holistic needs of the individual and the impact on their wellbeing, as well as the risk of transmission of scabies to the wider school population.

Encourage the affected individual to complete all recommended doses of treatment. It is important that the full treatment course is completed. This may involve several treatments spread out over time. Scabies transmission requires prolonged skin to skin contact and transmission through casual contact is unlikely.

Supporting management of long term conditions (Asthma, Epilepsy, Diabetes)

NHS Herefordshire and Worcestershire are currently working on transformation projects in relation to supporting children and young people to manage long term conditions. As part of this programme of work, they hope to work with schools and education to improve awareness and management of long term conditions in these settings.

They would like to begin by signposting to some free online training opportunities and resources which will provide the skills and knowledge that are required to ensure safe care for children and young people living with asthma, epilepsy or diabetes.

Review of Legislation

School management Teams are requested to review national legislation which sets out good practice for the management of medical conditions at school.

Asthma

Asthma is the most common long term medical condition in children and young people in the UK. Herefordshire and Worcestershire are currently experiencing high numbers of admissions for children and young people presenting at secondary care with an exacerbation.

Herefordshire and Worcestershire Integrated Care System are currently working to achieve standards on the National Bundle of Care published by NHS England to create better services and support for children and young people living with Asthma. There are many standards to achieve across health, education, public health, housing and local authorities, one area is around the development of Asthma Friendly Schools. To be recognised as an Asthma Friendly School, each school must address a set of criteria that establishes an Asthma Friendly environment and meets current legislation from the Department of Health guidelines.

In preparation for this process, we would recommend that the following half hour online training is completed by any staff at your school who are first aid trained and would be responsible for administering medications or responding to a child suffering an asthma attack. A CPD certificate will be issued by education for health on completion.

Type 1 Diabetes

Type 1 diabetes is an auto-immune condition in which the body's own immune system attacks the cells in the pancreas which produce insulin. We do not know what causes type 1 diabetes although it is not linked to lifestyle factors. There is currently no cure, and it cannot be prevented. There are currently around 400,000 people living with type 1 diabetes in the UK and approximately 29,000 of them are children.

Appropriate management and early detection of type 1 diabetes is essential to preventing the onset of life-threatening Diabetic Ketoacidosis (DKA). Herefordshire and Worcestershire Integrated Care System would like to raise awareness of the signs and symptoms of type 1 diabetes to prevent delays in diagnosis; this includes plans for a local awareness campaign targeted at schools who are well positioned to recognise symptoms in children throughout the school day. Please see the attached poster for display in your staff areas which promotes awareness of 4 key signs of type 1 diabetes; increased thirst and toileting, tiredness and weight loss.

For those schools providing care for children with type 1 diabetes, a reminder that online training should be completed. The link below contains basic level training aimed at any teaching, management and support staff working with children with type 1 diabetes and advanced level training which should be completed by staff who are responsible for the administration of type 1 diabetes medications in school and those involved in the general wellbeing of children living with type 1 diabetes.

Epilepsy

Epilepsy is a neurological disorder that affects the brain and causes frequent seizures or unusual sensations and behaviours. While epilepsy cannot be cured, effective management can significantly improve a person's quality of life. Epilepsy is most prevalent in children and young people; around 0.6% of children aged 0-17 year have epilepsy. Prevalence of epilepsy rises up to 24% for children with learning disabilities.

Herefordshire and Worcestershire Integrated Care System would like to raise awareness around epilepsy, which takes many forms; some more visible than others. The following free online training provides information on epilepsy and what to do if a child experiences a seizure at school:

Latest funding news

BBC Children in Need Emergency Essential Programme Reopens for Applications

This programme, delivered by Family Fund Business Services, supports children and young people up to and including the age of 17 who are facing exceptionally difficult circumstances with items that meets their most basic needs.

Applications must be completed by a registered referrer who is part of an organisation that is supporting the family or young person and capable of assessing their needs. The referrer's organisation should also be able to administer and supervise the grant on their behalf.

The programme can deliver or fund critical items such as:

- Cookers
- Furniture
- Kitchen equipment and small appliances
- Children's beds and bedding (including cots)
- Washing machines and tumble dryers
- Fridges, freezers and fridge-freezers
- Baby equipment
- Clothing for an emergency/crisis

The support is for children and young people under 18 years of age, who are UK or EU citizens normally resident in the UK, and whose family does not have access to support and insufficient resources to meet the child's needs.

Consideration may be given where a child or young person, or their family, have an asylum application under assessment or in circumstances where residency criteria is not consistent across the family unit.

There are no deadlines. Applications are processed usually within 10 working days.

Funding for Young People for Volunteering or Community Service Projects

The Alec Dickson Trust supports volunteering or community service projects in the UK that are organised and run by young people aged 30 and younger.

Grants of up to £500 are available to individuals or small groups of young people in the UK to help them put their ideas into action and run projects that benefit the lives of others.

The funding is for UK based projects that:

- Support and encourage youth volunteering, particularly those that involve lots of volunteers and encourage young people to stay engaged as volunteers in the long term.
- Have a positive impact on disadvantaged communities and individuals. Projects should identify a specific need and how to clearly address this need. There is particular interest in projects that will have a deep and meaningful effect on those it reaches, as well as projects that are as long-lasting and sustainable as possible.
- Are innovative and try to do things differently. This could be addressing a real need for the community or doing something that has not been done before.

Applicants will need to provide a referee who know them in a professional capacity, but who is not part of the volunteer project.

Applications are reviewed on a quarterly basis (January, April, July and October).

The deadline for the current round of applications is **1st July 2024 (10pm)**.

All volunteers will receive comprehensive training and ongoing support from our dedicated library staff. Worcestershire Libraries are seeking dedicated volunteers to contribute a minimum of 5 hours of their time over the summer, assisting library and learning staff in delivering this year's Challenge. Last year 116 young volunteers completed an impressive 1,600 cumulative hours. Among them, six volunteers contributed their hours from SRC activities towards their Duke of Edinburgh Award accreditation.


Here's a bit about the competition!
